CONJUNCTIVAL CYST (Retention Cyst)

The conjunctiva is a thin, clear layer of tissue that covers the white portion of the eye as well as the inside of the upper and lower eyelids. A conjunctival cyst is a thin-walled sac or vesicle that usually contains or retains fluid. This sac or vesicle may develop either on or under the conjunctiva. Occasionally these cysts are present in the conjunctival tissue that covers the white part of the eye, but it is often common to find them in the conjunctival tissue that lines the inside of the upper and/or lower eyelid.

Since they may resolve on their own, conjunctival cysts generally require no treatment. On occasion, the positioning of these cysts may make it necessary for them to be drained or treated with anti-inflammatory medications. In most cases, conjunctival cysts are nothing more than a trapping of fluid and are not associated with any degenerative process.
