



In order to help you understand the care we have provided; I have prepared this examination report to address the principal features of your eye health and your vision correction requirements.

POSTERIOR SYNECHIA (sin-nee'-kia)

Posterior synechiae are abnormal adhesions formed from the iris (the colored portion of the eye) and the lens that lies immediately behind the iris. The most important cause of posterior synechiae is ocular inflammation of any type, including trauma or an inflammation of the eye called anterior uveitis.

These adhesions may result in an irregularly shaped pupil and a partial occlusion (blockage) of the normal fluid channel within the eye. Such a blockage increases the risk of glaucoma with potential vision damage due to the fluid pressure increase within the eye.

Treatment consists of attempting to minimize further formation of adhesions by quickly treating any present inflammation. Efforts may be made in the office to attempt to release these abnormal adhesions through repeated dilating drops and careful clinical monitoring.
